

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

"Look Out, Man Giving Birth!"

As I heard those immortal words of my nurse, I could not help but think that I was a novelty in the emergency room. No pain should be equal to that which I was enduring. A nurse cried out that it was easier to give birth to twins than to have the pain from the little jewel I was carrying what was this abnormality? What could cause such a unique experience? Kidney stones. I felt that I was giving birth to triplets as well as a set of twins. What is a kidney stone? Why do they hurt so much? Can they be prevented? Let's read on!!!!

These jewels are literal stones that form in the urinary tract. These diamonds in the rough are nothing new, they have been around for literally thousands of years; however. during the past few decades the pattern and rate of this disease have changed remarkably, according to one study, 10 percent of all males in the U.S. will suffer from kidney stones (the majority being over 30 years of age) and 5percent of all females will suffer from this ailment. In hospitals, one in every 10,000 admissions is from these little iewels. The rise in frequency of kidney stones appears to be

rate of increase in

other diseases

associated with

the so-called "western diet": heart disease, gallstones, high blood pressure, and diabetes. Some 75 to 85percent of stones are calcium salts, 5-8 percent are from. Influenced by uric acid, and 10-15 percent are struvite stones. This influence can be related to the region, environmental factors and the eating habits of the region.

Usually there are no symptoms until the stone blocks t he urinary tract, Resulting in excruciating pain, which originates in the back and side and then radiates around to the groin. It may cause symptoms such as vomiting, fever, chills and death if left untreated, such was the case of my secretary's aunt.

Here are six simple things that we can do to avoid kidney stones:

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
