





He never worried about anything after that day in the ball turret over Romania in WWII. To this day Walt laughs in the face of conflict and drama. Walt was a flight engineer. He did not have to ride the ball turret. There was a need and he did not hesitate to do his

I was a light weapons infantry specialist serving in RVN with company D, 1/327th infantry (airborne). One morning in late 1970 we were in the field near FSB Bastogne. We heard and felt many heavy explosions close by. We saw a red star cluster rise up from the direction of the explosions. Alpha company had been heavily rocketed and was expecting a ground attack. They had heavy casualties so we had to rush to their aid.

When we arrived near A company we were told to run down the trail and set up defensive positions for the impending ground attack. We were not allowed to stop to render aid, we were in a rush.

The soft moaning of men with reduced lung capacity and horrible screams filled the morning air. We ran to the defensive positions - past the mangled mass of men and equipment. Past the man softly moaning for his soon-to-befatherless children. Past the men crawling in the dirt faceless, limbs missing, dragging their own intestines behind them. We defended against a ground attack that never came. Our own artillery on FSB Bastogne had fired on and accurately hit our own men.

5-4 or someone else seated at a desk in the rear with the gear had decided that the men they detected with sensors or side ranging radar were hostile forces. They were in fact our own fathers and sons.

It is hard to explain the unconditional respect and devotion most combat survivors share for one another. We stand together, shoulder to shoulder, against the drama perpetrated pretty much by one wife and her man(?), at the VFW in Key Largo.





# History: Interesting Facts about Life in the 1500s

Next time you are washing your hands and complain because the water temperature isn't just how you like it, think about how things used to be. Here are some facts about the 1500s:

Houses had thatched roofs
--thick-- straw-piled high, with
no wood underneath. It was the
only place for animals to get
warm, so all the cats and other
small animals (mice, bugs) lived in



the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on floors to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on, they added other more thresh until, when you opened the door, it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entranceway. Hence: a thresh

Sometimes they could obtain pork, which made them feel quite special. When visitors came over, they would hang up their bacon to show off. It was a sign of wealth that a man could, "bring home the bacon." They would cut off a little to share with quests

causing lead poisoning death.
This happened most often with tomatoes, so for the next 400 years or so, tomatoes were considered poisonous.

Lead cups were used to drink ale or whisky. The combination would sometimes knock the imbibers out for a couple of days.

Someone walking along the road would take them for dead and prepare them for burial. They were laid out on the kitchen table for a couple of days and the family would gather around and eat and drink and wait and see if they would wake up. Hence the custom of holding a wake.

England was old and small and the local folks started running out of places to bury people. So they would dig up coffins and would take the bones to a bonehouse, and reuse the grave. When reopening these coffins, 1 out of 25 coffins were found to have scratch marks on the inside and they realized they had been burying people alive. To avoid this, they would tie a string on the wrist of the corpse, lead it through the coffin and up

They used to use urine to tan animal skins, so families used to all pee in a pot & then once a day it was taken and sold to the tannery. If you had to do this to survive you were "Piss Poor". But worse than that were the really poor folks who couldn't even afford to buy a pot they "didn't have a pot to piss in" and were the lowest of the low on the economic scale.


Most people got married in June because they took their yearly bath in May, and they still smelled pretty good by June. However, since they were starting to smell, brides carried a bouquet of flowers to hide the body odor. Hence the custom today of carrying a bouquet when getting married.

Baths consisted of a big tub filled with hot water. The man of the house had the privilege of the nice clean water, then all the other sons and men, then the women and finally the children. Last of all the babies. By then the water was so dirty you could actually lose someone in it. Hence the saying, "Don't throw the baby out with the Bath water!"

When it rained it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence the saying "It's raining cats and dogs." There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house. This posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings could mess up your nice clean bed. Hence, a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection. That's how canopy beds came into existence.

The Tradition of the Bouquet

The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something other than dirt. Hence the saying, "dirt poor." The wealthy had slate floors that would get slippery in



and would all sit around and chew the fat.

Those with money had plates made of pewter. Food with high acid content caused some of the lead to leach onto the food,

through the ground and tie it to a bell. Someone would have to sit out in the graveyard all night (the graveyard shift) to listen for the bell; thus, someone could be, saved by the bell or was considered a dead ringer.



If we leave our friends out of our process when the going gets tough, our friendships can begin to feel shallow.



# Crime Stoppers of the Florida Keys

Crime Stoppers of the Florida Keys is a communitybased program designed to help law enforcement solve crimes by rewarding anonymous tipsters who supply criminal information that lead to arrests. Crime Stoppers can only work through the combined efforts of the community, the media and law enforcement. Crime Stoppers is actually a non-profit corporation run by a civilian board of directors. The rewards are paid from donations raised by the board. Tax money is not used. Crime Stoppers is a successful local, state, national and international program.

### How Crime Stoppers Works...

Crime Stoppers operates a toll-free number that is answered by trained staff members. Anyone who has information about a crime or a criminal can pass it on by using the 24-hour hot line or online at www.tipsubmit.com. Tipsters may choose to remain anonymous. A code number is given to the tipster. Names are never used. Any tips received on the hot line are passed on to the appropriate law enforcement agency for investigation. If the tip results in an arrest, the program's

independent civilian board can give a reward of up to one thousand dollars. The tipster picks up the reward at a local financial institution by using the code number. The code number protects the anonymity of the tipster, which is essential to success of the program. The tip line is 1-800-346-TIPS (8477). Crime Stoppers works! There are hundreds of Crime Stopper programs in operation around the world. In Florida there are 25 Crime Stopper programs serving all 67 counties. Locally, the organization has been in operation in the Keys since 1992.

#### How You Can Help...

Since Crime Stoppers does not use tax money; donations are needed to help fund the reward program. A donation to Crime Stoppers is an investment in a safer community. Crime Stoppers gets criminals off the streets. If you want to actively participate, Crime Stoppers always needs volunteers to serve as board members. 






# Memory Loss & Advertising

Patient - Doctor, I can't remember anything! I forgot what happened yesterday. I forgot what my car looks like. I can't even remember my own name.

> Doctor - How long have you had this problem? Patient - What problem?

Do you ever remember the face but can't place the name? Walk into a room and forget what you were looking for? Forget important dates? Look everywhere for your eyeglasses when they are on top of your head?

It's called the "tip-of-the-tongue" phenomenon. Your brain stores half the information such as the meaning of a word or the image in one section and the actual word or name in the other side. For reasons such as stress or information overflow your brain gets congested and the communication does not go through. Losing your train of thought is very similar. You are thinking too many things at once. The brain cannot compute and asks for a time out. Thus is the case of memory loss. It happens to all of us. So with many of us experiencing memory loss how is advertising effective?

Consider these facts:

(1) As we age our memory declines, yet, older people have more disposable income, eat out a lot, shop, travel and read newspapers, making them a target market. When people read offline they tend to have longer attention spans. Internet reading is useful for gathering quick info but people tend to pay more attention to what they read in print. Meaning, print advertising is still the best way to reach this very demographic.

(2) People, of all ages, forget what isn't in front of them. If you cancel an ad during a slow period you lose all your momentum. It's like starting from scratch all over again. It is better to be consistent and keep your company name constantly in their face. Remember when you were in grade school and got a multiplication problem wrong or misspelled word? The teacher made you write it 100 times? That is repetition and it impacts your memory.

It's the same principle with advertising. You must see an ad on a consistent basis for it to "sink in".



# Social Experiment

A man sat at a metro station in Washington DC and started to play the violin; it was a cold January morning. He played six Bach pieces for about 45 minutes. During that time, since it was rush hour. it was calculated that thousands of people went through the station, most of them on their way to work.

Three minutes went by and a middle-aged man noticed there was music playing. He slowed his pace and stopped for a few seconds and then hurried up to meet his schedule. A minute later, the violinist received his first dollar tip: a woman threw the money in the till and without stopping continued to walk.

A few minutes later, someone leaned against the wall to listen to him, but the man looked at his watch and started to walk again. Clearly he was late for work.

The one who paid the most attention was a 3-year-old boy. His mother tagged him along, hurried but the kid stopped to look at the violinist.

Finally the mother pushed hard and the child continued to walk turning his head all the time. This action was repeated by several other children. All the parents. without exception, forced them to move on.

In the 45 minutes the musician played, only 6 people stopped and stayed for a while. About 20 gave him money but continued to walk their normal pace. He

collected \$32. When he finished playing and silence took over, no one noticed it. No one applauded, nor was there any recognition.

No one knew this but the

violinist was Joshua Bell, one

of the top musicians in the world. He played one of the most intricate pieces ever written, with a violin worth 3.5 million dollars. Two days before his playing in the subway, Joshua Bell sold out at a theater in Boston and

the seats averaged \$100.

This is a real story. Joshua Bell playing incognito in the metro station was organized by the Washington Post as part of a social experiment about perception, taste and priorities of people. The outlines were: in a commonplace environment at an inappropriate hour: Do we perceive beauty?

Do we stop to appreciate it? Do we recognize the talent in an unexpected context?

One of the possible conclusions from this experience could be: If we do not have a moment to stop and listen to one of the best musicians in the world playing the best music ever written, how many other things are we missing.

#### Side Note:

On the other hand, how many things do we stop and listen to only because circumstance dictates it is to be appreciated. Would we stop to listen to poorly performed music if the venue gave it prominence and socially we were told it was popular?




