Tradewinds Midwinter Open Cat Nationals

The 2012 Tradewinds Midwinter Open Cat Nationals were held at Founders Park in Islamorada with three days of racing over the Martin Luther King weekend. The annual event drew 70 high-speed, high-tech beach catamarans from all around the USA, as well as top world-class sailors, including Olympic Medalist Pease Glaser of Huntington Beach, California.

US Sailing, the governing body of all sailboat racing in the United States, selected the Tradewinds Regatta this year as its selection regatta for U.S. Youth Multihull World Qualifier, and for the U.S. Youth Multihull Championship, and the selection of the top two teams for development for the 2016 Sailing Olympics.

The class of boat used for the event was the F16 catamaran. There are a number of manufacturers and all must build the boats all to the same specs. These extremely fast catamarans reach speeds over 30 mph in ideal conditions. And the conditions were ideal that during the race weekend. Even though Friday was windless, Saturday and Sunday had winds around 20 mph and higher. These boats were literally flying around the buoyed courses.

Winning the F16 Youth Championship were Jeremy Herrin and Same Armington of Sarasota, Florida winning by 10 points over Ben Brown and Luc Lisi of San Francisco, California, and rounding out the Podium was Joseph Bello and Shelby Brown of Fort Walton Beach, Florida.


Winning the selection for the Olympic Development team was former Junior Champ, Sarah Newberry and Matthew Whitehead of Miami, Florida, winning convincingly over Past Olympic Gold Medalist, Pease Glaser, of Huntington Beach, California with John Williams Crewing. Third spot went to Mike Easton and McKenzie Wilson from Lexington, Massachusetts.

Local Florida Keys sailors made the podium in two different classes of catamarans. Leah White of Key Largo finished in second place in the Hobie Wave Class





behind Ray Matuszak of Putin-Bay, Ohio. Mike Phillips of Miami, Florida rounded out the top three in that class. Kelly Davis of Islamorada, Florida took second place in the Open Cat Class (this class is made up of all kinds of boats that do not have a class of their own, and they race on handicap numbers). There were six different classes of catamarans racing. Other classes were the Nacra20, the F18 Class and Hobie16s.
