

Entertainer of the Month: Rod Hui Recording Engineer, Mixer, Producer and Instructor

When multi-platinum sound engineer, mixer and producer Rod Hui is home in Key Largo you may see him visiting friends at the Pilot House or stopping by the Big Chill for a cold beer. You would never guess that he is famous, and one of the early pioneers of hip-hop and rap recording. So famous that he travels the world turning music into best-selling albums.

Since Hui began his career in 1977 he has mixed hits for Shannon, Run DMC, Kurtis Blow, LL Cool J, Public Enemy, George Bensen, Chaka Khan, Mary J Blige, Aretha Franklin, Pete Rock, and Whodini, as well as recordings for Bonnie Tyler, Air Supply, Salt-N-Pepa, Ah-Ha and John Cale. There are more, but we only have so much space!

Rod has a knack for being involved with an artist at the beginning of completely new genres. He has produced and mixed "Let The Music Play" for Shannon, "It's Like That" and

"Sucker MC" for Run DMC. Rod also mixed "Hot Cool and Vicious" for Salt-N-Pepa, as well as "It Takes a Nation of Millions" and "Fear of a Black Planet" for Public Enemy. These continue to be important underpinnings for the direction of pop music today.

Rod helped define a sound that is a strong foundation for much of today's popular music. While building on a significant foundation of technique, experience and major record label relations, Rod has embraced today's recording and mixing technology and continues to raise the bar for record production.

Rod is an instructor at the Clive Davis Department of Recorded Music at NYU and has been teaching courses there since 2005. "Having the opportunity to pass on my experience and knowledge to the next generation of recording engineers and producers is most rewarding."

We hear that Rod makes a delicious and healthy stir fry. Wok 'n' roll, Rod!


