

Innocent Souls: Vietnam 1968

An exhibition of images captured by 1st Lieutenant Glenn Hoover in the Republic of South Vietnam in 1968 will be on display at the Key Largo Library Community Room for the months of November and December, 2015. Admission to the exhibition, "Innocent Souls: Vietnam 1968" is free and open to the public. An opening reception will be held on Sunday, November 8th from 3:00 - 6:00 PM. The Waypoint Foundation, a private not for profit devoted to celebrating human creativity and operating out of Key Largo is the primary sponsor of the exhibition.

This exhibition features photographs captured in 1968 during the peak of the conflict known by Americans as the Vietnam War and by Vietnamese as the American War. After sitting as slides in Glenn's closet for over 43 years, these images have taken on a new life on canvas. Some of these photographs are portraits of the Vietnamese and the Montagnards who lived there, while others are of the young American soldiers who were visiting.

Glenn arrived in Vietnam in January of 1968 through a series of voluntary choices, based on beliefs of service to his country instilled in him by his



father. Glenn, an Army ROTC graduate of Cornell University in Ithaca, NY, received a Silver Star, Bronze Star "V" Device, Army Commendation Medal and Combat Infantryman's Badge. He has worked years in the hospitality industry, owns Glenn Hoover Real Estate and lives in Key Largo, Florida.

Additional images by Glenn will convert the Womankind building windows at the corner of Truman Avenue and Eisenhower Drive in Key West into an art gallery to commemorate the dedication of the Vietnam Living Memorial in Bay View Park on November 11th. The project is sponsored in part by the Florida Keys Council of the Arts, the State of Florida, Division of Cultural Affairs, the Florida Council on Arts and Culture, the National Endowment for the Arts, The Waypoint Foundation, Womankind and private donations. Alan Kennish III of Key West Fine Art Photography and Printing has been commissioned to bring the compelling images to dramatic full-window size (approximately 8 feet \times 7

feet). The images will remain in the windows throughout November and December. Ms. Kim
