Part of my job is to go and photograph these hardworking artists at their gigs. Rarely are they working under perfect conditions. The sun is in their eyes, they are drenched with sweat from the heat, they have a major headache or a cold coming on. They cover themselves with bug spray or are fresh meat for mosquitoes. If the

clouds suddenly turn black and dump buckets of rain on them they have to scramble to try to cover their equipment to keep it safe. They deal with drunk customers who run up to the stage spilling their drinks on them yelling "Play Freebird, dammit!" or "let me sing a sona!" If the weather report is predicting rain, their gig may be cancelled and they don't get paid after lugging all their equipment to the venue. If they get sick or hurt and cannot work, they are at the mercy of their friends to help. Performers rarely have a backup plan. Most of these entertainers are the first to volunteer their services when needed for a benefit to help others. 100% of the money we raise goes into the

Musicians Relief Fund. If you have a particular skill call us and volunteer to help.

What do you call a musician without a girlfriend? Homeless.

We had someone come to the last benefit and sit down and berate us for 20 minutes because I had set up a Facebook event and had somehow listed it as private so others could not invite more people. Sorry, I'm not that computer savvy. A simple phone call could have solved that problem and helped us out. I have had a extremely painful torn sacroiliac tendon and I'm wearing a back brace that slows me down but I still managed to get it done. They say "no good deed goes unpunished," and ain't it the truth?
