


Our musicians are the first to sign up to make a community fundrasier or benefit a success.


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The People of WalMart Have to Live Somewhere

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
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Rethinking Complaining

When we spend our time complaining, we are in essence in destroy mode rather than building mode.

We all know someone who has elevated the process of complaining to a high art. Sometimes funny, sometimes exhausting, these people have the ability to find a problem just about anywhere. In its more evolved form, complaining is simply the ability to see what's not working, in one's own life or in the external world, and it can be quite useful if followed to its natural conclusion--finding a solution and applying it.

However. many of us don't get that far, and we find that complaining has become an end in itself In small doses, this is not a big problem, but if complain-

ing has become a huge part of our identities, it may be time to take a good look at how we are spending our energy.

Complaining is a person's way of acknowledging that they are not happy with the way things are. In a metaphorical way. when we complain or criticize, we are tearing down an undesirable structure in order to make room for something new. But if all we do is tear down. never bothering to summon the creative energy required to create something new, we are not fulfilling the process.

In fact, we are at risk for becoming a stagnant and

destructive force in our own lives and in the lives of the people we love. Another issue with complaining is that we sometimes tend to focus on other people, whom we can't change, as a way of deflecting attention from the one person we can change--ourselves. So transforming complaining into something useful is a twofold process that begins with turning our critical eye to look at things we can actually do something about, and then taking positive action.

> When we find ourselves complaining, the last thing we need to do is get down on ourselves. Instead, we can begin by

noticing that we are in the mode of wanting to make some changes. But rather than lashing out at somebody or an organization, we can look for an appropriate place to channel this energy--not our neighbor's house, but possibly parts of our own.

Finally, we can ask ourselves the positive question of what we would like to create in the place of whatever it is we want to tear down. When we do this, we channel a negative habit into a creative process, thus using our energy to change the world around us in a positive way.

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
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Artist of the Month: Ash Meharg



35 Years Ago this Month, the Florida Keys Seceeded from the U.S., and the Conch Republic was Born

On April 18, 1982, Border Patrol established a roadblock on U.S. 1, just south of Florida City. The only access point by land from the Keys to the mainland was closed, and people leaving the Keys were treated as though they were exiting a foreign country.

The U.S. Border Patrol claimed that the roadblock was established to stop "illegal" immigrants from entering the mainland United States from the Florida Keys. Every car leaving the Keys was checked thoroughly by the Border Patrol, including unlikely hiding places such as glove compartments and under

The 17-mile traffic jams that accompanied the roadblock had an immediate negative impact on tourism in the Florida Keys. Reservations were canceled, hotels stood empty, and local attractions had no customers.

Community leaders from Key West filed an injunction against the U.S. Border Patrol roadblock in Federal Court in Miami. The court ruled that the roadblock could continue.

As Key West Mayor Dennis Wardlow left the courthouse, he was greeted by press from around the world. When asked what would happen next, the mayor said, "Tomorrow at noon, the Florida Keys will secede from the Union!"

The press — and federal agents — flooded Key West the next day. As promised, at noon on April 23, 1982, Mayor Wardlow read a Proclamation of Secession, declaring that Key West would be a sovereign nation known as the Conch Republic.

Having changed his title from Mayor of Key West to Prime Minister of the Conch Republic, Wardlow followed his mock secession with a declaration of war on the United States. The "war" started and ended with loaves of stale Cuban bread being broken over the head of a man dressed in a U.S. Navy uniform.

After one minute of rebellion, Prime Minister Wardlow surrendered to Union forces at the Navy base in Key West. He immediately demanded \$1 billion in foreign aid and war relief "to rebuild our nation after the long federal siege."

With their highly publicized mock secession and fake war against the United States, the residents of Key West successfully used humor to bring attention to a serious issue affecting the local economy.

Following widespread reports of the establishment of the Conch Republic, the U.S. Border Patrol roadblock was quickly and unceremoniously removed.

Today, the Conch Republic continues to issue its own passport. The republic has its own flag with the motto "We Seceded Where Others Failed." In April each year, Key West residents and visitors celebrate the independence of the Conch Republic

THE CONCH REPUBLIC Proclamation of Secession – April 23, 1982

We, the people of the Florida Keys, wish to proclaim to the world our independence from the State of Florida and the United States of America. We hereby declare ourselves as Conchs and that our land, Monroe County, known previously as the Florida Keys, now be known as The Conch Republic.

To proclaim this, an explanation is in order. To wit: The original Conchs came from the Bahamas to the Florida Keys because they were sickened with tyranny, arrogance, abuse of rights and lack of compassion for humanity by a despot English King. They were known as "Conchs" because they raised flags with the tough, hard conch shellfish, protesting they'd rather eat conch than pay the King's taxes and live under his abuse. Now, 400 years later, we find similar dictatorship from the State and Federal levels.

We serve notice on the government in Washington to remove the roadblock in Florida City, across the highway from "Skeeter's" Last Chance Saloon. It discourages tourism, upon which we rely, and it obstructs the everyday flow of business from the mainland to the fabulous Florida Keys. We also ask Washington to put up a permanent border to a new foreign land.

We also serve notice to the bureaucrats in Tallahassee to pull out your State Troopers, DEA agents and all other busybodies who try to tell us how to live, buy and sell properties, and generally confuse the issues of our local government.

We, as residents of the Conch Republic, refuse to suffer any longer from fools and bureaucrats in Tallahassee and Washington! We're not going to beg or beseech them any longer for help. We want one simple thing — Equality.

Here is our flag we so proudly fly. It has a conch shell, sunburst and stars of the Southern Cross and Big Dipper.

We secede from the United States.

We have raised our flag, given our notice and named our new government.

We call upon the world to recognize us as the Conch Republic.

We call upon our residents, the Conchs, to join us and stand together, lest we fall apart – Fall from fear, from a lack of courage, intimidation by an uncaring government whose actions show it has grown too big to care for people on a small chain of islands.

Know ye, that we hereby present this proclamation to the world.


