Mary Kay Amerling died May 19th at Crystal Health and Rehab on Plantation Key after a lengthy illness under Hospice care. She was born in St. Louis, MO. to Kent and Luella Middleswart. Her family relocated to Hamilton, Ohio when she was young. She attended Ohio State University majoring in English.

Mary Kay had been a resident of the Florida Keys for over 30 years working as a bartender at the renowned Hukilau Bar in Key West and many service industries in the Upper Keys. One of her favorite memories was when she lead the first all female crew of the Key West Sailing Club race to Cuba. The women's team won the first leg of the race because Mary Kay instructed them to remove their tops and sail topless, throwing off the male crews. They lost the return leg because they decided to stop, visit and sail back with bottlenose dolphin.

Mary Kay had a memorable life living in San Francisco, CA., Truro, MA. with time camping on the beach in Isla Muieres, Mexico. She had a variety of interests including reading, sailing, snorkeling and scuba diving as well as supporting many non-profit groups promoting animal and nature.

Mary Kay is survived by her brother and his wife, Ed and Judy Middleswart who live in Pensacola, FL. and a nephew Dale Middleswart. Her neighbors, and the staff at the Monroe County Library, Key Largo Branch were very important to her life and hand delivered books to her at the Rehab center.

The afterlife is graced by her presence now and she is probably fishing with her Dad, reading with her nephew Alex Middleswart, and slipping in a few hands of Knockout Bridge with her Mother.
