

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
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Editorial - Great Events and Mother's Day



Celebrating a Life Well Lived - Alma Pinder Dalton

"Survivor, kind-hearted, welcoming, humble, with an unsurpassed faith in God and people," are words I would use to describe Alma. I was lucky enough to meet her and her sister Dorrie years ago. They shared some homemade seagrape jam as they told us the story of surviving the 1935 Labor Day "Storm of the Century."

Alma, at age 11, sister Dorrie 8, and brother Joe, 5 years old survived the strongest hurricane ever to hit the United States. The roof flew off, their house was blown apart, and they were thrust into the raging storm waters, with fierce rain and wind so strong it could rip your skin off. They survived by floating on a mattress and tying themselves to a tree so they wouldn't be washed away into the Florida Bay.

In one interview Alma says, "we didn't have time to be scared" as the family scrambled into survival mode.

Their mom, Ida, was pinned down by debris, suffering broken bones. Father Bertrand was struck by flying debris. Both were hospitalized, but miraculously they survived as well.

Each child handled the natural disaster with grace, gratefulness and by never losing their faith. The remaining Pinder family, alongside the Parkers, Russells, Alburys and Cothrons, helped with the efforts to rebuild Islamorada. Despite Mother Nature's wrath, many members of these founding families continued to live in the Keys.

Recently, I had the pleasure of speaking with Corie McGraw-Abel, granddaughter of Alma, and a seventh generation Pinder. She is proud of her family's Conch Republic history and she's doing her part to preserve the sense of community that the Keys are known for. Her husband, Terry Abel is the fire chief

of Islamorada. Her oldest daughter attends USF in Tampa studying Biology and her youngest daughter goes to Coral Shores High School.

Corie and I both agree that more people should dive into the history of this island chain and learn the trials and tribulations of its founders. The rich history of this area is truly unique, with stories of survival, salvaging and rebuilding. (I am a guide for the Food & Fun Tours

in Islamorada and will tell stories about the history as

we walk and eat around the heart of Islamorada - once known as Pinderville. Website www.flkeysfoodtours.com or 305-393-9183 for rates and availability.)

Alma passed on Easter morning, April 4, 2021, she was 96. She was born in Key West on April 22, 1924 to Bertram and Ida Pinder. Her 96th birthday celebration in 2020 was at the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic, while the Keys were closed to tourists and non-residents. Family and friends organized a drive-by procession with fire trucks and police cars leading the way. Many were sporting

Many were sporting signs, and some gave cards and gifts to this amazing woman as she waved back from the shade of her yard in Islamorada. She was in awe at how many people passed by that day to honor a true Keys pioneer.

On April 8th, 2021, Alma joined her brother and sister at their final resting place, the Matecumbe Memorial
Gardens outside the Islamorada Methodist Church. In a
gathering of about 100 people
paying their respects to a
woman who warmed hearts

and touched souls with her stories and home cooked meals. She was the last of two survivors who lived through the horrific hurricane on Labor Day 1935. Her unwavering spirit and faith will live on through Corie and other proud Conch Republic founding families.



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



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Living Dockside and Furloughed

It's definitely been tough times in the Keys due to this Covid-19 stuff. With the Keys literally shut down, a lot of us found we were put on furlough. Some were lucky enough to get unemployment; others not so lucky.

I had a lot of time to do boat projects. I have two port lights in the aft cabin to pull out and replace. But these don't leak, so if it ain't broke, you know the rest of that saying. How about the on-board water tanks? She Breeze holds 100 gallons of water in port and starboard water tanks.

Starboard has a small leak way down at the bottom where the plumbing comes out, and that is where it leaks. All I have to do is pull the holding tank out, cut through a fiberglass wall and... screw that, on to something simpler.

I have wanted to repaint She Breeze's sheer line since Irma left it all scratched to hell. How hard could that be! Last time I had her bottom painted, I asked around to have the sheer line done also. Nobody would do it, one person gave me a quote of \$2800. I thought how fricking hard could it be? It's less than a foot wide area and yes, it's

41 feet each side. I figured a week at most.

I chose a one-part Polyurethane paint called Brightside, (yeah man, the shiny stuff!). I started on the stern; easy to get to due to a nice swim platform on her backside. So I sanded off the old She Breeze lettering (that hurt), taped up the lines to follow, primered, and did my first coat of rolling and tipping. That entails using a small roller and doing only a couple of feet at a time with paint and then comes the dreaded tipping, which means using a fine haired paint brush and just ever so lightly dragging it across the paint.

I stood back in amazement at what it looked like, it was shiny and beautiful, and I fell off the boat. I shouldn't have stepped back, oops!
Crawled out, dried off and continued the first coat.
Waited the appropriate interval and did the second coat.

I made that sound so easy, didn't I? Remember I still have 80 feet to go.
Decided to do the starboard side first, so had to take She Breeze out and turn her around and put that side up to the dock. Onward with sanding and taping, and screw the primer, the trick is only



do a 2- or 3-foot section at a time. But I had to keep painting until I came to a chain plate before I could stop.


Rolling, tipping, rolling, tipping. Now I understand the quote for \$2800! Bottom line, it took three weeks to complete the job. Some wiseass told me you evaluate this kind of paint job in 10-foot, 20-foot or 30-foot increments. If you stand back 10 feet and it looks great you accomplished



something wondrous. My paint job is somewhere between the 15 foot and 20 foot range... but hey, I wanted something simpler, right?

'What wrong with you?" he demanded. This woman is 63 years old, she has two grown children and several grandchildren, and you told her she was pregnant?!!"


The new doctor continued to write on his clipboard and without looking up said "Does she still have the hiccups?"

However, it's also fair to say that we don't want to become so caught up in one way of looking at events that we lose perspective.

Often, the news comes to us in a very fearoriented format, and when too many of us get caught up in fear, the balance of the whole is disrupted. It helps to remember that we have a much greater and more positive impact on the world when we maintain our inner sense of peace and joy.

We are aware enough to know when we are eating something that is not good for us, because we don't feel well after we've eaten it. In the same way, we can determine for ourselves whether the sources in which our information comes are ultimately

News can be presented in a way that inspires us to take positive action to help the world, or it can be presented in a way that leaves us feeling powerless and sad.
