



I am the product of my predecessors. Dad had a model T or A, maybe both a T and A. His folks admonished him for driving like a maniac up in the hollows of West by God (Virginia). She got pulled over all the time for speeding and always got away with it, being the apologetic, little old lady. She





## Critters in Our Midst: Wading Birds by Carol Ellis

The more I write about nature, the more people identify me with the subject. Every week, I get texts and emails with pictures, links to articles and sometimes even a call to get out here NOW... there's a huge flock of birds at the three way... referring to the intersection of Card Sound Road at Crocodile Lake in North Key Largo. From Ocean Reef, as you turn north on Card Sound Road, it is the first wetland to the right; a productive birding spot.

Such was the case on January 31st, about 8:00 am on a really cold morning with overcast sky when I received a call from Jeanette Rivera, naturalist at Ocean Reef, who was heading to work when she spotted a huge congregation of wading birds. She snapped a photo with her iPhone and in it were White Ibis, Great Egret, Cattle Egret, Roseate Spoonbill, White Pelican, Great White Heron, Reddish Egret and Wood Stork. It was just beautiful. Rivera said, "I was in shock that there were so many birds in that one spot! It was really magical... special... I love it!" As you can tell, Jeanette is very passionate about nature.

Of the birds present on this morning, the Roseate Spoonbill, Wood Stork, White Pelican, and Great White Heron were a special treat, as they are most typically seen flying overhead, but on this day they were all here!

According to Isabella Collamati, Invasive Species Biologist at Crocodile Lake National Wildlife Refuge, "time of day, time of year, temperature, and tide would probably be the biggest factors for why they chose to gather that day. It all lined up

so that the water was deep enough to host enough prey to keep all parties interested, but shallow enough to make the hunting easier." The birds' diet consists of minnows, mullet, and killifish, and they are pickier about size than species.

By the time I arrived, some of the birds had already left, but there were still dozens of birds. I had fun photographing the Reddish Egret and its distinctive

hunting behavior. As it searched for fish, it would do a "crazy dance" as it jumped and hopped back and forth with outstretched wings raised over its head, peering at the water. The wings cast a shadow so they can see the prey better. The Reddish Egret is also one of the rare egrets, with only 2,000 pairs thought to be breeding in the U.S.

from. Historically wading birds nested in the small Keys and nearby mangrove islands, within Florida Bay, far from human disturbances. The Everglades supports 70-90% of all wading bird nests annually. Wading birds initiated approx 89,514 nests in the Everglades in 2021. The wading bird nesting in 2021 was the highest recorded in 80 years.

A Roseate Spoonbill sat grooming on a red mangrove perch. Not sure, perhaps it was there because the tide had risen and its short legs were no longer able to maneuver in the deepening wetland. Spoonbills have the broadened bill-ends full of nerve endings, to feel for animals when mud grubbing.

Though not a wading bird, I saw a Belted Kingfisher hunting near this shallow wetland. The Kingfisher can regularly be seen perched on the power lines along Card Sound Road.

Winter and Spring is nesting season for these birds, though I am not sure where these particular birds were

## Caribsea Victorious at 40th Islamorada Women's Sailfish Tournament

### Hosted by Ladies, Let's Go Fishing — A Thrilling Battle to the Finish!

The 40th annual Islamorada Women's Sailfish Tournament, January 31 to February 2, delivered an exhilarating competition with 52 sailfish releases, including multiple quads and triple hookups. This milestone event was hosted for the first time by Ladies, Let's Go Fishing (LLGF), a well-known organization dedicated to teaching and empowering women in the sport of fishing. Participants fished from their own boats or aboard chartered vessels.

#### A Tight Race to the Finish

The competition was fierce from the start. Day 1, Tunnel Vision took an early lead with 4 sailfish releases, followed closely by Caribsea with four releases while Kay K IV had one. However, Day 2, the sailfish bite intensified, setting up an exciting showdown between Kay K IV and Caribsea for first place.

In a dramatic finish, just 2 minutes before lines out, Caribsea landed a crucial double-header, including a release by Jolene Chandler of Jacksonville, who had never released a sailfish prior to the tournament. This final push secured Caribsea's victory with 11 sailfish releases, while Kay K IV claimed second place with 8 releases. Silent Hunter took third place, earning High Point Angler honors for Alysha Aratari, who logged an impressive 8 sailfish releases.

The tournament upholds a strong commitment to conservation, ensuring all sailfish are released and limiting fishing to 20 lb. test line. Tammie Gurgiolo, Tournament Director for the past 29 years, helped transition the event to its new host, LLGF.

Betty Bauman, LLGF Founder and Tournament Director, remarked: "Half of the anglers on the top two boats had never released a sailfish before. This tournament proves that whether you're a seasoned angler or a beginner, the excitement is unmatched!"

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



## What's Behind Those "Crocodile Tears"?



expression with a pretty long history. It appeared in print in the 16th century, inspired by a medieval belief that crocodiles would shed tears to attract their prey or show false remorse after eating them. The 14th-century travelogue belonging to Sir John Mandeville has one of the earliest mentions of this idiom, describing crocodiles that cry while eating. Now, this is definitely a myth, but it's an excellent way to add some drama to the origins of the expression.

"Crocodile tears" doesn't literally refer to the big reptile shedding tears but has a metaphorical meaning. It exposes people who fake cry, putting on a show to attract sympathy. The idiom appeared in numerous literary

creations, one of them being "Othello" by Shakespeare.

The expression is still popular nowadays and can be used in all sorts of contexts, from calling out someone you know personally to criticizing controversial celebrities, politicians, and more. It puts the individual on the spot, revealing that their sorrow is anything but genuine. A similar phrase is "alligator tears" which you may also hear showing up in daily talks.

When you're facing someone who seems to open the floodgates suspiciously or when it doesn't make sense to do so, remember to let them know they appear to be just as honest as the weeping crocodile. It's very likely to run into someone crying crocodile tears because the world is full of people who want all the attention.

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

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## What Makes Us Feel "Under the Weather"?



Ever heard a someone say that they're feeling under the weather? We've all been there. This phrase suggests that they aren't feeling their best. You may have used the phrase yourself, but do you have any idea about its origins?

It all began with the maritime field, where the "under the weather" idiom seeds were planted. The Oxford English Dictionary mentions that this phrase was printed in the 19th century. At the time, sailors were affected by the rough seas, causing them to feel unwell. The sea became savage when a vicious storm hit, hence the expression "under the weather." It basically refers to being affected by stormy conditions while navigating the waves.

This story isn't set in stone, though. Some suggest that another possible origin of the phrase is ill sailors being sent below deck to recover from the wild weather.

Like many other phrases, "under the weather" shifted from the nautical landscape and migrated to our daily language. Anyone not feeling all right would use the expression to let others know about it in the late 19th century. Its addition to literary creations in the 19th century helped push it toward mainstream language even more.

"Under the weather" has become a standard phrase nowadays, and whether you use it yourself or not, you must've heard it around you at some point. It allows you to express your feelings while sparing people the less comfortable details of your illness. Some similar phrases are "out of sorts" or "feeling off-color."

How close you are to the fierce waves of the sea doesn't matter - anyone can be under the weather today, and the phrase remains a staple in our vocabulary. When you feel the expression escaping your lips, just remember its origins from the old days of seasoned sailors who had to battle violent waves to reach their destinations.

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



On the shirt back is Carol's image of Ruby Stern, matriarch of Downtown Card Sound Road, a place that doesn't exist on any map... yet was home to a community of free spirits, fishermen and independent thinkers who took up residence there. Located on the west side of the road south of Alabama Jack's, and the toll booth, the shack was originally built by workers who constructed the toll bridge around 1968. In 1972 Ruby moved in and lived there for 27 years. She'd sit on the steps of her shack, with an old Colt 44 daring anyone to throw her off the land. She stayed. Not even the destructive forces of hurricane Andrew and the county's condemnation of the shack could send her from her spot on the bay on Card Sound. She moved to a trailer alongside and lived there until 1999 when she had to leave due to illness, and died at age 90.
