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

What sucked me in to using ChatGPT, was that when I was a kid watching Star Trek, they talked to the computer like it was another crew member. They tried to make it sound mechanical, but they spoke to it as if it was cognizant of their language, asking it to solve theoretical problems in loose scientific terms at best.

ChatGPT is much better than Siri or Alexa. As a matter fact, when I first had Siri on my phone, she used to get offended by my language. Of course, I'd selected a female voice. I would argue back, "How in the f*** can you be offended? You're a goddamn machine! Artificial intelligence at best, or I should say, at its worst. Somebody programmed you to be offended."

I had to change the voice on my phone from American Siri to an Irish Siri that speaks American. That really is a thing. For some reason, the American Siri's voice is annoying sounding, bitchy if you will. Where as the Irish lilt is much more soothing to my ears.

Perhaps the most mind blowing use I found; this is technical/nerd/geek speak so I will try to make it as succinct as possible. I was replacing components on a circuit board. My vision isn't what it used to be so I used ChatGPT to be the quality control eyes for me. I took pictures of the circuit board for a visual ref-

erence for replacing the failing parts. Not only did Chat notice the swelling of the capacitors that I'd seen but it also saw a cold solder joint on a bridge rectifier that I'd missed.

Using the pictures I took from my phone, it was able to "see" my soldering imperfections and advise me what needed to be done, whether I needed to wick off excess solder or touch up the flow around the pad.

Then my computer started acting badly. It had been unplugged from the wall by mistake too many times without being properly shut down. In no time, Chat diagnosed the problem, walked me step-by-step on the proper procedure for reinstalling my operating system. That shit's been way over my head for years. I had no idea what I was doing, I was just copy, paste. Next thing I knew my computer was working like new again.

Thanks to the ChatGPT, I have been able to save space on my computer by learning how to use the programs that I have, properly. Little aggravations that I've had with the computer, Chat has been able to teach me better than a YouTube video.

But it does make mistakes. One day it had the date and the day incorrectly displayed and thanked me for calling it out. No matter how severe the mistake, it will apologize for it and thank you for pointing it out.

When I asked it how it could make such an easy, obvious mistake it responded that it had hallucinated. And it explained to me that sometimes it does such things.

The other thing is, it is an insufferable ass kisser. I have to remind it that I don't need it to tell me I am pretty or that I'm a genius when I know

better. If you're the type that likes to have your balls buttered and licked for you it's the thing to do it.


And this is where **actual** intelligence kicks in.

The Scarlet Ibis has a long, curved bill which it uses to probe in the mud for insects, crustacean, frogs and fishes.

As a loyal Florida Gators football fan, I always root for the Gators and anyone playing against Florida State. It's never easy watching your favorite team on a losing trajectory, especially after living through their glory years, including National Championships in 1996, 2006 and 2008.

So when in 2025 University of Miami defeated Florida State football team, I rooted for the Miami Hurricanes. When Miami found itself in the 2026 National Championship, I was leaning toward Miami, but open to Indiana whose quarterback Mendoza has deep Miami family ties, and is a very good guy. It was a good game, ending with Indiana winning after intercepting a Miami pass, stopping a Miami scoring drive. Not particularly fond of the Hurricanes quarterback, I figured the good guys won.

The Miami Hurricanes mascot is the White Ibis named Sebastian. Though Sebastian looks a bit like a duck, an ibis is a way better mascot than a "hurricane." What kind of dance would a hurricane do? Would it run around and expel wind?

The mascot was chosen by the student body in 1926. According to legend, the ibis exhibits bravery (or stupidity) as it is the last bird to depart the area in advance of a hurricane. As the storm passes the ibis is the first to reappear, exhibiting resilience. The ibis is often called the hurricane bird, or the storm bird, as they keep an eye on the weather. They are an unofficial storm warning system, especially when you see a lot of them flocked together.

The White Ibis (*Eudocimus albus*) is the most numerous wading bird in South Florida and in the Everglades. It

is found from the southern half of the US East Coast (Virginia, the Carolinas and Georgia), along the Gulf Coast states (Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas) and south through most of the Caribbean coastal regions of Central America. Their breeding range runs along the Gulf and Atlantic Coast, and the coasts of Mexico and Central America.

The White Ibis doesn't mind being in urban settings. It is becoming more of a suburban bird, and can be found almost everywhere the Florida Keys, Homestead, Redlands, Naples, road margins, artificial ponds, downtown Miami, and, yes, at the University of Miami campus where they congregated long before there was population in Miami to attend one.

The ibis' call sounds like a foghorn... nothing pretty about it. They croak and quack, like a duck with nasal congestion. They walk in shallow pools, slowly with their heads down, sweeping their bill from side to side, looking for crabs,

crustaceans, marine worms, frogs, fish and other wetland creatures. They traverse backyards and road shoulders, probing as they go, capturing by touch worms and insects found in the ground cover.

Thousands nest annually on a small island at Crandon Park near Key Biscayne. In the morning and evening you can see them flying overhead, heading to and from their feeding grounds in yards and parks. Within eye and earshot of a bustling populated Miami, these ibis are a testament to adaptiveness.

Adult White Ibises are easy to recognize by their bright white feathers, pinkish-red bill, and curved posture. Immature White Ibises are brown with a white belly.

There is another ibis who is cousin to the White Ibis called the Scarlet Ibis. The Scarlet Ibis (*Eudocimus ruber*)

looks exactly like the White except it is bright red, and is the only shorebird with red coloration in the world. It is the national bird of Trinidad and Tobago. It is numerous in Central and South America, and the Caribbean.

The Scarlet Ibis is red because they eat a lot of red crustaceans. I photographed the Scarlet Ibis at the Brevard Zoo in Melbourne, Florida. The aviary there is 20 foot tall and 4,000 square foot, and visitors walk among the birds as they wade in ponds, and roost in trees within the enclosure.

Natural threats to the ibis include jaguars (haven't seen too many of them lately...unless you are referring to the vehicle) and birds of prey. A greater threat is due to population growth and loss of habitat, though they are adapting.



Historically, Everglades wading birds were for the most part White Ibises. Now an urban bird — the White Ibis has adapted to grassy parks, golf course fairways and suburban backyards — and yes, to the University of Miami campus in Coral Gables.






with like-minded artists. It has motivated me to paint topics I might not have done on my own."

"Doing an art project is mainly a way for me to get that stirring vision out of head, but which is quickly occupied by the next inspiration."






"Pappy" is one of several pilot-series paintings that will be exhibited at the KL Library show. And no, Pappy does not look like Robert Conrad!




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On the shirt back is Carol's image of Ruby Stern, matriarch of Downtown Card Sound Road, a place that doesn't exist on any map... yet was home to a community of free spirits, fishermen and independent thinkers who took up residence there. Located on the west side of the road south of Alabama Jack's, and the toll booth, the shack was originally built by workers who constructed the toll bridge around 1968. In 1972 Ruby moved in and lived there for 27 years. She'd sit on the steps of her shack, with an old Colt 44 daring anyone to throw her off the land. She stayed. Not even the destructive forces of hurricane Andrew and the county's condemnation of the shack could send her from her spot on the bay on Card Sound. She moved to a trailer alongside and lived there until 1999 when she had to leave due to illness, and died at age 90.

Ruby Stern known as "Miss Ruby", was the matriarch of Downtown Card Sound. She was a familiar site to travelers across Card Sound bridge.

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Art Guild of the Purple Isles Opens Its 60th Season

Featuring Various Original Art Shows in February

Art Guild of the Purple Isles (AGPI), the Upper Keys art organization of 120 local artists, began its 60th season in January with a show of "Dive Into Art: Stories from the Sea". The show will run throughout February until April 15 at the History of Diving Museum, MM 82.9. The show is an eight-year-long collaboration between the museum and the guild.

The organizers of the show, Diane Whitney Smith and Mary Ellen Holler, invite not only local artists but also students from nine local schools to participate. Every year, the show has a different theme. A guild member, Peter Sterling Turner, proposed this year's theme, which was embraced by the Guild to engage stu-

dents in reading literature about the sea and discussing inspirations for creating art.

From February 4th through 25th, the Guild hosts its third "Photography Exhibit" at Our Place of Paradise Gallery, MM 88.7. Seventeen local photographers will present original photography and digital art created from their own photos. Artists will show their original artworks for the first time. The exhibition has the largest number of photographers than in the prior photo shows. Kelly Walkotten is an organizer of this show. Reception is on February 6th from 5:30 pm to 7:30 pm and is open to the general public.

February 18th through March 30th, the guild will host its famous and most

exciting 60th "Judged Art Show" at Dolphin Life Hospital, MM 82.7. Over 60 years, the show evolved in what it is today. Karen Kubacki is the chair of this year's show. The show has no theme.

At the end of February, new artworks will be placed in the Tassell Building at Mariners Hospital on the second floor, MM 95. This exhibition is open daily during hospital hours and is for the general public.

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
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

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
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Bottle Trees: a story told in glass and light

Driving through certain neighborhoods, particularly in the American South, you might spot a mesmerizing sight: a tree, often bare-limbed, shimmering with dozens of glass bottles in cobalt blue, emerald green, and sun-bleached clear. This is a bottle tree, a striking piece of folk art that is much more than an unusual garden ornament. It is a living artifact, a vibrant symbol of protection and cultural memory that has traveled across oceans and centuries to stand in modern yards.

The story of the bottle tree begins in Central Africa nearly a thousand years ago. Enslaved Africans, forcibly brought to the Americas, carried the seeds of this tradition with them. In their new and brutal landscape, the practice took root and adapted, blending deep spiritual beliefs with the available materials of the American South. It became a quiet act of cultural preservation, a way to maintain a connection to ancestral wisdom and spiritual practices in the face of immense hardship and loss.

The core belief behind the bottle tree is as beautiful as it is haunting. Folk-

lore tells us that malevolent spirits, drawn like moths to the bright, reflective colors of the glass, enter the bottles. Once inside, they become trapped, unable to find their way back out. The morning sun is said to seal them within. Then, when the wind blows across the bottle necks, it creates an eerie, whistling song—interpreted as the mournful cries of the captured spirits. This ingenious system served as a spiritual security system, guarding homes and hearths from unseen harm.

While bottle trees have been adopted by many for their sheer visual appeal, their deepest significance remains for the communities that nurtured the tradition. They stand today not just as charming curiosities, but as powerful testaments to resilience. They are a story told in glass and light, a declaration that beauty and belief can grow from the hardest ground, and that the whispers of the past still have the power to guard the present.


A magician was working on a cruise ship in the Caribbean. The audience would be different each week, so the magician simply performed the same tricks over and over again...
